Being the Bad Guys: How to Live for Jesus in a World that Says You Shouldn't

No longer just quaint or irrelevant, Christians in Western society are once again regarded as "haters of humankind". After exploring the ways a Christian worldview is unacceptable in contemporary Australia and the complex situations in which this places orthodox believers, Stephen McAlpine gets down to business. There is neither reason nor time for indulging in despair or victimhood. Being the Bad Guys calls on Christians to admit our failures and embrace life as a creative minority. As a community on the margins, we can welcome the actual victims of contemporary culture as they look for grace and solace from its bruising brutality. McAlpine is fearless, feisty and fluent. This book is an overdue reset for Christians who have not yet realised that they are more like Daniel in Babylon than Solomon in the land of milk and honey.

Judging criteria

The Australian Christian Book of the Year Award is given annually to a book written by an Australian citizen normally resident in Australia. The award recognises and celebrates excellence in Australian Christian writing. A shortlist is announced in July and the award is presented during September. The award carries a prize of \$3,000. Supplementary awards may be made. Entries are judged with an eye to the following:

Original nature of the work.

Literary style, including suitability for the target audience.

Competence and expertise displayed by the author in writing the book and examining the underlying thesis.

Design, layout, cover, text and illustrations.

Contribution that the book makes in meeting a need for Christian writing for the Australian situation and in the Australian market.



Judith Nichols has four children and fourteen grandchildren. She has a doctorate in classics and







Judging the Macquaries: Injustice and Mercy in Colonial Australia John Harris Acom 9780647530412





Megan Southon Daisies in Winter

To escape her constant battle with crippling social anxiety, Daisy writes poetry. However, to be open to the

prospect of love she must look beyond her secure and stagnant solitude. Daisy turns from asking God, "Why am I like this?" to begin a courageous journey of self-acceptance. Daisies in Winter combines immersive, stylised self-talk with natural dialogue to explore the struggle for self-discovery which characterises adolescence. Tension is generated by drawing tangible parallels between external events and the protagonist's internal world. Daisies in Winter is warm, mature and thoughtful. The struggle and the triumph is learning to reach out to God, not just once, but on a daily basis.

An extract from Daisies in Winter

Daisy reclaimed her bag. Because she wanted to. She wanted to be in control of her safety, her 'happiness' and herself. Maybe that's why God never helped her. She always reclaimed her baggage.

She only realised the reality a minute into the walk. Jack was walking her home, sharing an umbrella with her.

She was scared. Forced into a fork in a road. Two choices. Speak, and mess everything up. Don't speak, and mess only a lot of things up. Don't speak, she chose.

She wished she had the ability to express herself in prose as she did in poetry. No such luck, so it was better to keep her mouth shut.

The silence wove its way into her heart, slowing its rhythm. Into her mind, quieting the voices of failure. A welcome silence. Usually silence only turned up the noise in her mind.

Jack broke the silence. The unusual, awkward safety.

"I wish you'd talk."

His words drizzled down to the bottom of her heart. No-one, except Jeremy, ever wanted her to talk, to be herself. No-one ever thought there was more to her than meets the eye. He'd seen the real Daisy, somehow, and that unlocked all the doors in her heart.

That was what allowed her to be simply Daisy for the rest of the purposefully slow walk home. She talked. He listened. He talked. She listened. Safe. It was a different kind of safe. It was beautiful. A daisy blooming through winter.

An extract from Creativity and Faith in Postmodern Australia

Beauty is evidence of premeditated grace. It is the joy of God materialised. In the Book of Job, when God finally responds to Job's cries for an explanation of his suffering, he offers no theological argument, nor explicit sympathy, nor reference to Job's circumstances. Instead, he uses poetry. God sings of what he has created: the humble and the great, the gentle and the terrible. Have a read of Job 38–41. God stops to pay tribute to his design for the weather. He casts the constellations—which men like Job named—as living creatures ruling the Earth in a firmamental drama.

God's theodicy includes even the wild donkey. Job cannot argue with such a performance. He remains in silent awe, in ashes, humbled beyond even his sufferings. I wonder what Job must have felt in that moment? Perhaps a sense of limitless love. A sense that not even his ruin can blemish the indestructible joy God has poured out in all things. A sense that he is no longer himself, having witnessed in a fraction of time the torrential majesty of his Maker's hands.
